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Only the Seventh Celtic-Rangers Final

THOUGH they have been competing in the Scottish Cup for 78 years, Rangers and Celtic have surprisingly met only six times in the final—in 1894, 1899, 1904, 1909, 1928 and 1963. As you can see from the tables of finals of both clubs, Rangers have won three and Celtic two, the other final not having been played to a conclusion.

Rangers had been in existence 21 years before they won the Cup for the first time. Celtic, on the other hand, gained their first victory in the final only four years after the club was formed. Rangers' inception was 15 years earlier than Celtic's.

No final victory has given Rangers greater satisfaction than the 4-0 result against Celtic in 1928. Rangers had been in the Scottish Cup wilderness for 25 years (including the years of the First World War). From 1903, when they beat Hearts after a second replay, until 1928 they had been in only five finals and won none. Celtic in contrast had been in 11 finals in the same period and had won nine of them!

A penalty kick goal by Rangers' captain David Meiklejohn set Rangers on the road to the long-coveted final victory. These were the teams that 120,000 welcomed to Hampden on April 14, 1928:

Rangers—Hamilton (T.); Gray and Hamilton (R.); Buchanan, Meiklejohn and Craig; Archibald and Cunningham; Fleming; McPhail and Morton.

Celtic—Thomson (J.); McStay (W.) and Donoghue; Wilson, McStay (J.) and McFarlane; Connolly and Thomson (A), McGrory, McNally and McLean.

Fourteen minutes of the second half had gone when Willie McStay handled a shot by Jimmy Fleming which was a certain scorer. Meiklejohn took the penalty kick in circumstances which could not have been more trying. He made a perfect job of it and Rangers thereafter never looked back. Bob McPhail and Sandy Archibald (2) completed Celtic's discomfiture.

Thirty-five Years Later

THE next Celtic-Rangers final was not to take place until 35 years later. Bad weather played havoc with fixtures in season 1962-63 and the Cup final was played on May 4—a fortnight later than the date scheduled. But it was not until May 11 that the trophy was won. The final was drawn 1-1 and as Scotland had an International fixture at Hampden in the following midweek the replay was held back until the following Wednesday.

The first match could have been a goalkeeper's nightmare for the Hampden swirl and a ball made slippery by rain added to the normal hazards. But the Celtic goalkeeper, the controversial Frank Haffey, unenvied loser

of nine Scottish goals at Wembley two years earlier, was the bane of Rangers existence with cool, skilful saving.

Celtic Come from Behind

THE one addition to the Celtic first-team pool since they won the Scottish Cup a year ago is Joe McBride, who was transferred from Motherwell in the close season for a fee of approximately £20,000. McBride's scoring feats in themselves have thoroughly justified the expenditure.

Mr. Jock Stein, who succeeded Mr. James McGrory as Celtic manager last March, has guided the players who were at Parkhead when he returned—and McBride—to the Scottish Cup, to the Scottish League Cup, and almost certainly to the Scottish League championship.

In the first real test for Stein and his men—the Cup final against Dunfermline Athletic a year ago—they had to produce all the traditional fighting spirit of their club. Twice Dunfermline led by a goal and twice Bertie Auld, who had recently returned to his first senior club from Birmingham City, headed an equalising goal. Dunfermline's scorers were Harry Melrose, once a Rangers player, who is now with Aberdeen, and John McLaughlin, now a Motherwell player.

As in the previous year's Cup final a replay was looming up when the deciding goal came. It was a story-book ending for Celtic's captain Billy McNeill. He had made several fine efforts to head a goal from corner kicks and 10 minutes from time he rose superbly over everyone, and, timing his effort perfectly, he headed Charlie Gallagher's corner kick away out of the reach of every defender. The attendance for Celtic's first Scottish

Cup success since 1954 and their eighteenth in all was 108,000. The teams were:

Celtic—Fallon; Young and Gemmill; Murdoch, McNeill and Clark; Chalmers and Gallagher, Hughes, Lennox and Auld.

Dunfermline Athletic—Herriot; Callaghan (W.) and Lunn; Thomson, McLean and Callaghan (T.); Edwards and Smith, McLaughlin, Melrose and Sinclair.

Referee—H. Philipps (Wishaw).

There have been no departures among the Celtic players in that final. But Jim Herriot and Jackie Sinclair as well as McLaughlin and Melrose are in other football pastures now.

Time and again he saved his side. Here were the teams in the 1-1 draw, watched by almost 130,000:

Rangers—Ritchie; Shearer and Provan; Greig, McKinnon and Baxter; Henderson and McLean, Millar, Brand and Wilson.

Celtic—Haffey; MacKay and Kennedy; McNamee, McNeill and Price; Johnstone and Murdoch, Hughes, Divers and Brogan.

Referee—T. Wharton (Clarkston).

Ralph Brand began the scoring from a Willie Henderson cross but only three minutes afterwards and just before half-time, Bobby Murdoch equalised, following a run and shot by John Hughes which both Billy Ritchie and Bobby Shearer could only partly stop.

George McLean was injured midway through the second half and moved to the left-wing and he was missing for the replay, the teams in which were:

Rangers—Ritchie; Shearer and Provan; Greig, McKinnon and Baxter; Henderson and McMillan, Millar, Brand and Wilson.

Celtic—Haffey; MacKay and Kennedy; McNamee, McNeill and Price; Craig and Murdoch, Divers, Chalmers and Hughes.

Referee—T. Wharton (Clarkston).

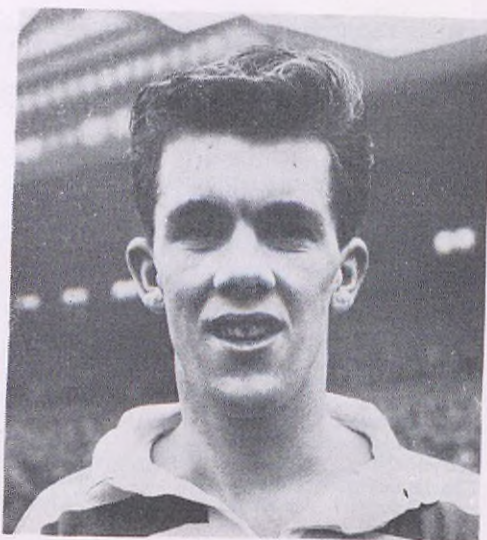
The attendance again topped the 120,000 mark, but this time they saw no dull, evenly contested match. Brand scored from a Henderson cross after only six minutes and Wilson in 44 and Brand again in 73 minutes gave Rangers a well deserved victory. They had reintroduced the skilful veteran Ian McMillan and his shrewdness helped to win the Cup. So in five years at Ibrox, where he had moved from Airdrieonians, McMillan had won three Scottish Cup medals.

Celtic's changes for the replay were much less happy. Bobby Craig, once of Third Lanark and Sheffield Wednesday, floundered in the unaccustomed position of outside right, and this time Haffey's heroics did not suffice.
