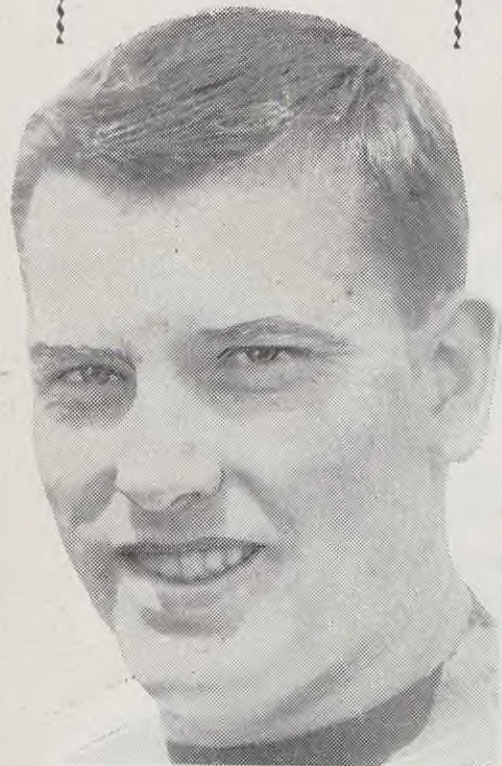

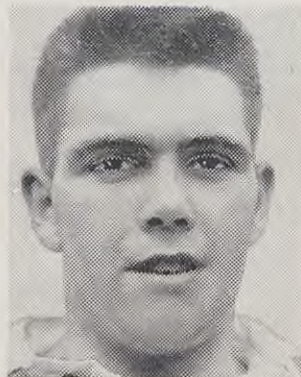
## Celtic's Top Scorer



**JOE McBRIDE,**

who is Celtic's top League Cup scorer with Seven goals

**RONNIE SIMPSON**—Goalkeeper—5 ft. 10½ in., 11 st. 13 lb. Had a comparatively simple task against Hibernian in Monday night's semi-final replay at Ibrox, but all he was asked to do was accomplished with quick decision and superb judgment. This son of a former Rangers centre-half has wide experience, for he was with Newcastle United before returning to Scotland to play for Hibs and then, of course, Celtic.

**JOHN FALLON**—Goalkeeper—5 ft. 11 in., 12 st. 3 lb. Signed from Fauldhouse Juniors in 1958. Reveals excellent anticipation and concentration, while he makes full use of the throw or the kick, generally finding the team-mate best positioned to receive it.

**IAN YOUNG**—Right-back—5 ft. 10 in., 11 st. 3 lb. Arrived at Parkhead from Neilston Juniors in 1961. His duels with Willie Johnston highlighted the Old Firm League match at Ibrox this season. A thoroughly dependable defender, strong and sure in the tackle and his pace and ability to move ahead with the ball once he has stopped a threat to his own goal are vital virtues that have made his berth secure.

**TOMMY GEMMELL**—Left-back—5 ft. 11 in., 10 st. 9 lb. Was again a telling factor in Celtic's semi-final replay with Hibs at Ibrox and was responsible for the draining of the Easter Road challenge from their right flank. Can confuse the opposition by carrying the ball far upfield and mixing with his own forwards as he did when Lennox notched the equaliser in the first game with Hibs. From Coltness Juniors in 1961, has fully justified his promotion to the first team.

**BOBBY MURDOCH**—Right-half—5 ft. 9 in., 11 st. Scored a magnificent fourth goal against Hibs on Monday night, coming on the ball from a cute Johnstone pass and blasting it behind the blameless Hibs 'keeper. Gave a sound display against the Irish League at Ibrox in September. Was travelling Reserve for the International against Ireland at Windsor Park. Should be a prominent player in Celtic's European Cup bid.

**WILLIAM McNEILL**—Centre-half—6 ft. 1 in., 11 st. 2 lb. Captained Scotland against Ireland in Belfast and also against Poland in the World Cup qualifying match at Hampden. And he will be a proud young man today if he goes forward to accept the League Cup. Joined Celtic from Blantyre Victoria in 1957, as a centre-half, but has also played at right back and right-half. Has a long list of International honours. A deadly header of the ball when he moves up to await a corner kick—either from the left or right.



**BOBBY MURDOCH**

**JOHN CLARK**—Left-half—5 ft. 7½ in., 11 st. Is in his seventh season at Parkhead, having signed from Larkhall Thistle in 1959. Once having taken over the left-half position, he has retained it by his enthusiasm and consistency. A determined middleman who goes up as an auxiliary forward once he has initiated a thrust. Also carries an accurate shot with either foot.

# Aim to Take the Trophy from Rangers

**JIMMY JOHNSTONE**—*Outside-right*—5 ft. 4 in., 9 st. 8 lb. When this little man gets on the move, he can cause many a heart to miss a beat in the opposing defence. A highly entertaining winger, he brings an involuntary roar of delight from the Celtic fans every time he is put in possession. From Blantyre Celtic in 1961, he is having his brightest season. His bouts with Davie Provan today should be as thrilling as they are far-reaching. His acceleration and change of pace can upset the most resolute defence, while he also carries a shot.

**CHARLES GALLAGHER**—*Inside-right*—5 ft. 8 in., 10 st. 10 lb. Injured a knee in Monday's replay with Hibs, but finished the game, and was one of Celtic's outstanding strategists. A deep-thinking, intelligent forward, sure in the pass and baffling in the swerve, while he also carries a shot. Arrived at Celtic Park from Yoker Athletic in 1958.

**STEVE CHALMERS**—*Outside-right or Centre-forward*—5 ft. 9 in., 10 st. 12 lb. Did not play against Hibs in the semi-final, but is clearly a player any club would want for the first team pool of players. Although signed as an inside-forward, he has played in almost every position up front. Fast and direct, his quick-on-the-draw marksmanship makes him a forward capable of winning the game before the opposition quite know what's hit them.

**JOE McBRIDE**—*Centre-forward*—5 ft. 8 in., 11 st. 8 lb. Is Celtic's top League Cup scorer. Got two in the sectional ties,

three against Raith Rovers in the quarter-final and two against Hibs in the semi-final. Was transferred during the close season from Motherwell. He is certainly doing the job Manager Jock Stein set out for him.

**ROBERT LENNOX**—*Inside-left*—5 ft. 6 in., 10 st. 6 lb. His alertness led to his vital equaliser against Hibs with time running out in the first of the two semi-final games, and notched another in the replay. Graduated from Ardeer Recreation in 1961. He has emphasised his skill and slickness in exploiting his chances. Uses the ball with intelligence. Is Celtic's established inside-left.

**JOHN HUGHES**—*Centre-forward or Outside-left*—6 ft. 2 in., 12 st. 4 lb. Is battling to win back his International berth. Played against Ireland at Belfast. This mighty young fellow was signed from Shotts Bon Accord in 1959. He first gained representative honours when he led the Scottish League attack against the League of Ireland at Dalymount and scored Scotland's only goal. Has netted many spectacular goals. Has been fielded on the wing as well as at centre.

**BERTIE AULD**—*Outside-left*—5 ft. 8 in., 10 st. 7 lb. Was brought back from Birmingham City last season to operate again at outside-left. He showed his versatility by operating at inside-right in the Celtic attack that scored seven goals against Aberdeen at Parkhead.

# Introducing the Ibrox Men who are

**BILLY RITCHIE**—Goalkeeper—5 ft. 11½ in., 12 st. 9 lb. Has been 10 years a Rangers player, joining in May, 1955. The Newtongrange born goalkeeper, having lost his place to Norrie Martin, came back when Martin was injured, and has played brilliantly. Inter-Milan and Benfica said of him that he is one of the world's finest keepers in dealing with a direct shot. Brings a confidence to the attack by his assurance and anticipation which can make a difficult task appear comparatively easy. There are those, however, who say he is suspect with a cross ball.

**KAJ JOHANSEN**—Right-back—5 ft. 11 in., 12 st. Has now settled into the Rangers defensive plan following his transfer from Morton during the close season. Fast and energetic, he likes to move upfield on his own, starting a thrust from out of defence. It will indeed be a happy day if he can win a League Cup medal and show it to a former noted Ranger, countryman Carl Hansen, the first of the Danish footballers to come to Scotland and gain renown.

**DAVID PROVAN**—Left-back—6 ft. 0½ in., 10 st. 10 lb. Born Falkirk. Is playing with even more resolution than when he gained his first International "cap"—against Ireland at Windsor Park two years ago. Edged Eric Caldow out of the left back berth this season, and has held the place. Does not give up easily, and has shown himself a staunch defender of the League Cup. Can also play at right-back.

**WILSON WOOD**—Right-half—5 ft. 7 in., 10 st. 6 lb. Brought on against Benfica in the second half of the Challenge match at Ibrox Stadium on September 28, he became one of the most effective middle men afield. He won back his first team berth from young Bobby Watson, and has retained it. Was with Newcastle before returning home and accepting Rangers' invitation to take a peg in the Ibrox dressing-room.

**BOBBY WATSON**—Right-half—5 ft. 10½ in., 11 st. 5 lb. Was brought into the first team after showing distinct promise in the Reserves. An intelligent youngster, swift and sure in the challenge. He can go up as an auxiliary forward. The Airdrie born half-back was signed in May, 1963.

**RONNIE MCKINNON**—Centre-half—5 ft. 11 in., 11 st. Born Glasgow. Signed in 1958 from Dunipace Juniors as a left-half, but is now recognised as among Scotland's most resourceful pivots. Was

included in our World Cup squad, although not chosen for the ill-fated match against Poland. Is having his best season, and the Ibrox hopes of retaining the trophy today could depend on how he comports himself.

**JOHN GREIG**—Left-half—5 ft. 11 in., 10 st. 8 lb. Born Edinburgh. Was booked from Whitburn Juniors in 1958 as an inside-forward, but gained International recogni-

tion when going to half-back. Came out of defence at Easter Road last Saturday to give Alec Willoughby the pass from which the inside-right scored the first of his two goals. Has a deadly shot. Played against Ireland and Poland this season and should continue to gather more International honours even though on the losing side in both games.

**WILLIAM HENDERSON**—*Outside-right*—5 ft. 5 in., 10 st. Pulled a muscle early in the World Cup qualifying match with Poland, and had to become an onlooker in the match against Hibs last Saturday. Has gained all the International honours, first as a schoolboy, then as a youth and now as a Senior. When in the mood, and adequately supported, he can cut open the most tightly-knit defence by his acceleration, baffling swerve and control. A tremendous favourite with the Ibrox crowd.

**DAVID WILSON**—*Winger*—(Right or Left)—or *Inside Forward*—5 ft. 6½ in., 10 st. 4 lb.—Ibrox's Mr. Handyman—can play on either wing. Scotland's former outside-left, in fact, has occupied every position as a forward, and actually scored six goals as a centre against Falkirk at Brockville. He came in for the injured Willie Henderson against Hibs last Saturday and gave another enthusiastic and courageous display. It was a sorry day when he broke a leg, but faced the fight back to full fitness with typical pluck and perseverance.

**ALEC WILLOUGHBY**—*Inside-right*—5 ft. 7 in., 9 st. 7 lb. Born Glasgow. Scored Rangers' two goals against Hibs in last Saturday's vital League match at Easter Road, with magnificent long-range shots. Became a Ranger in September, 1961, and so joined his cousin, Jim Forrest. Gave more than one refreshing display of cool, calculated football.

**JIM FORREST**—*Centre-forward*—5 ft. 8½ in., 10 st. 7 lb. Born Glasgow. Has suddenly become a chance-maker instead of a chance-taker, and as such has undoubtedly become a more profitable leader because, of course, he had retained his telling marksmanship. Indeed he is Rangers' top League Cup scorer with 10 goals. Generally excels on the big occasion. Arrived at Ibrox in September, 1961. Led the Scottish goal scoring chart last season with over 50 goals. Quick on the draw.

**JIMMY MILLAR**—*Inside-left*—5 ft. 7 in., 11 st. 10 lb. How fortunate are the Cup-holders to have a player with the skill and

power of the Edinburgh man to call upon for so many positions. He was a wing-half when secured from Dunfermline Athletic in January, 1955, but it was first as a centre-forward and then as an inside man that he hit the big-time. He lost his first team place following an injury, but, fit again, is always ready and able to step in when needed and no task is too arduous for him.

**GEORGE McLEAN**—*Inside-forward*—5 ft. 11½ in., 12 st. 10 lb. Born Paisley. Injured an ankle early in last Saturday's match with Hibernian, and limped for the rest of the game. He has been unlucky with injuries for he suffered a broken nose in the match against Benfica. Was transferred from St. Mirren in January, 1963. He has occupied the wing-half berth as well as inside wing-forward and centre-forward. Carries a tempestuous shot which he can deliver on the run or from a standing position.

**WILLIE JOHNSTON**—*Outside-left*—5 ft. 7 in., 9 st. 7 lb. Born Glasgow. The "discovery" of the World Cup qualifying match at Hampden. Has played for Scotland in Youth Internationals. His consummate skill, audacity, balance and pace are virtues that could have an important bearing on today's final. Does not suffer from "nerves." Indeed, he thrills in the challenge. It is obvious this young man has a particularly bright future.

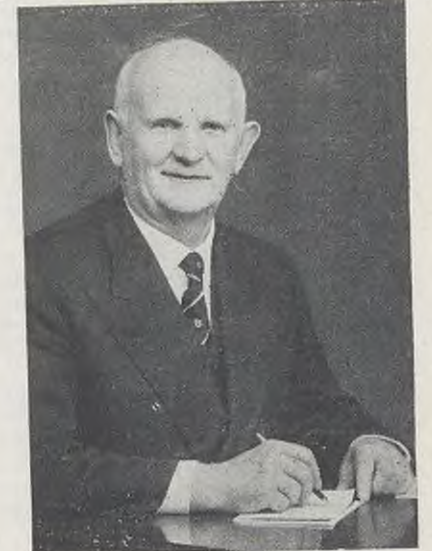

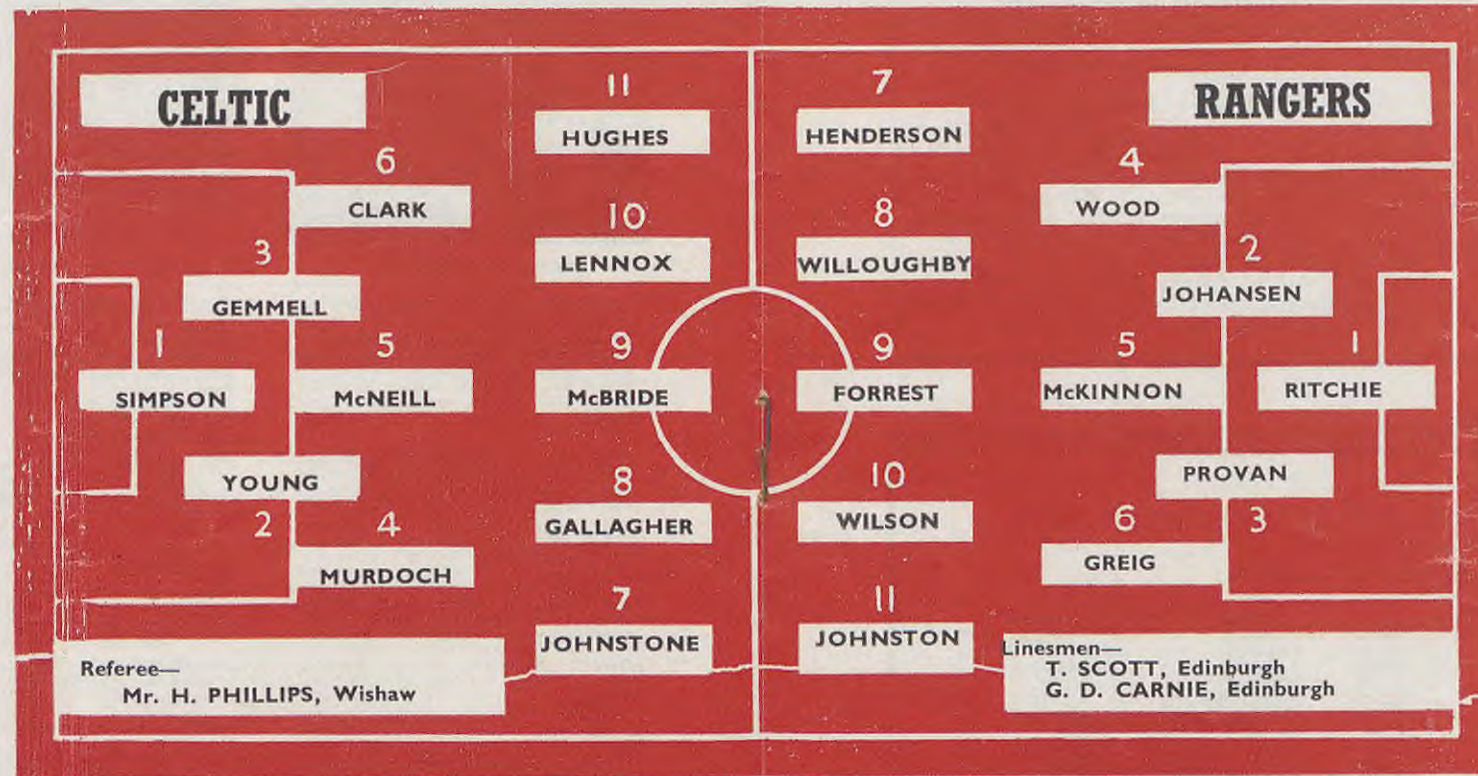

# Strange Things That Have Happened

**B**EFORE the advent of the Scottish League, clubs led a precarious existence. Usually there was little or no money in the bank and no supporters' clubs or development funds to give a helping hand. In his story of the League's origin, the late John McCartney (father of the late Willie McCartney), related an amusing experience.

The committee of a certain club—name withheld because it is still in being—was made up of the entire membership which included the players. At 2/- per head, the number would generally reach approximately 30/-.

A resolution was carried that three members be empowered to purchase a bottle of whisky "for rubbing purposes only," the bottle to be locked in the pavilion cupboard and only released when required in the presence of three members (excluding players).

*Sometimes the three members happened to be of one mind. Excuses were made that owing to bad weather, replenishments became more frequent.*

*Unanimity was seldom reached as to who was to lift the gate-money. Recriminations on these and other matters generally led to the meetings being adjourned more than once during the week.*

**E**LEVEN clubs formed the League in its first season, with St. Bernards omitted. They had been found guilty of the "terrible" offence of

paying their players what on present day standards would be merely coppers. That was professionalism and at that time every club in Scotland was supposed to be true blue amateur. Actually, with few exceptions, they were all handing out a modest remuneration.

*Professionalism was legalised in Scotland in 1893.*
