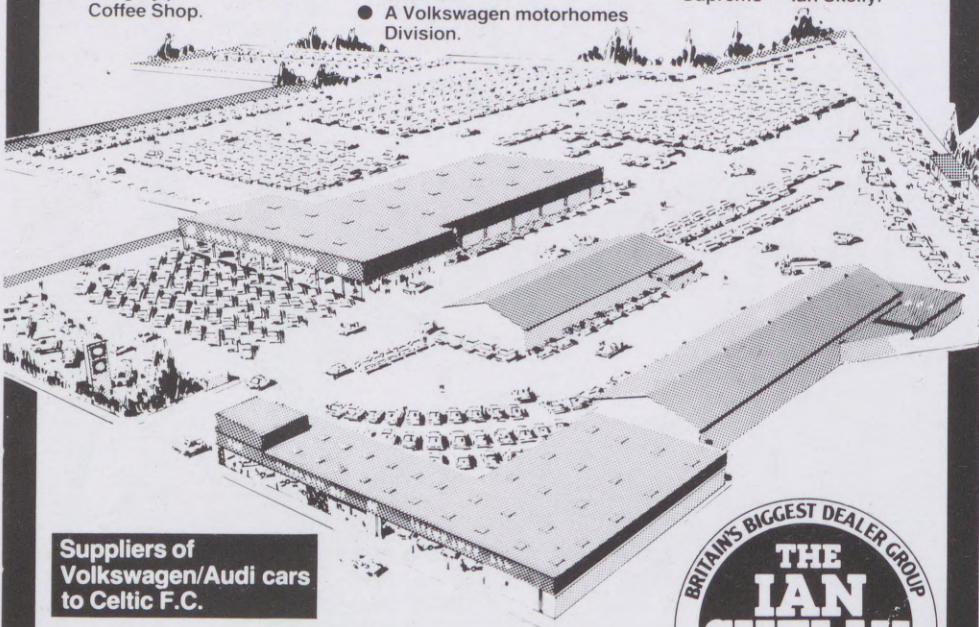

TODAY Rangers are our visitors on league duty and as we all know current league form seldom has a bearing on what happens during the 90 minutes of an Old Firm game.

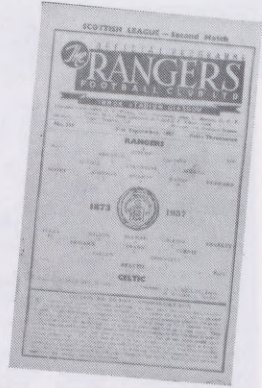

ALMOST every fan has a different memory of each game and therefore different favourite games. It would be hard to say which were the best Old Firm meetings in the long history of the fixture. Every one of us could come up with a different suggestion.

Today, let's look at two meetings during the 1950's, one on the home ground of each club.

The first was played at Celtic Park on Saturday, September 23, 1950. This turned out to be a high scoring match with Rae and Thornton scoring for Rangers and Donald Weir, Peacock and McPhail (with a penalty) making it 3-2 for Celtic. The teams that afternoon were: CELTIC: Bonnar;

Fallon and Milne; Evans, Mallon and Baillie; Collins and D. Weir; McPhail; Peacock and Tully. RANGERS: Brown; Young and Lindsay; McColl, Woodburn and Cox; Rutherford and Finlay; Thornton; Johnston and Rae.

Seven years later Ibrox was the venue on September 21, 1957. The programme for the game gave the following teams: RANGERS: Ritchie; Shearer and Caldwell; McColl, Valentine and Millar; Scott and Simpson; Murray; Baird and Hubbard. CELTIC: Beattie; Donnelly and Fallon; Fernie, Evans and Peacock; Sharkey and Collins; McPhail; Wilson and Tully.

Again there were five goals in the game and Celtic scored three through Collins, McPhail and Wilson.

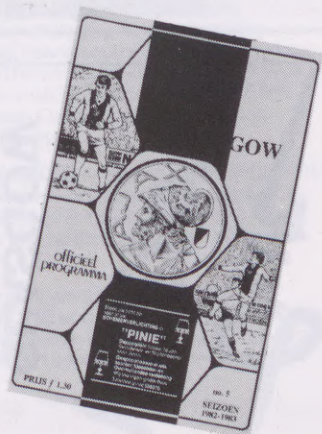
CELTIC ABROAD ...

THIS afternoon we feature a European Cup match which many of you will remember as it was played recently — on September 29, 1982.

It was the second leg of the European Cup first round for which Celtic travelled to the Olympic Stadium in Amsterdam to face Ajax who had Johann Cruyff in their ranks.

Having drawn 2-2 in the first leg at Celtic Park, Celtic had an uphill fight on their hands and thanks to magnificent goals by Charlie Nicholas and George McCluskey they won 2-1 to qualify for the next round.

The Celtic team in Amsterdam was: Bonner; McGrain and Reid; Aitken, McAdam and Sinclair; Provan and P. McStay; McGarvey; MacLeod and Nicholas. Substitutes: Moyes (McStay), Latchford, Sullivan, McCluskey (Provan), Crainie.

FACT FILE ON ...

GLASGOW RANGERS

ANDREW BRUCE — Goalkeeper signed on 'S' Form in 1980. Capped at Under-15 Schoolboy level and played at Wembley when Scotland won 5-4.

HUGH BURNS — Has Scottish Schools' Under-15 and Scottish Youth Under-18 caps. Farmed out at the age of 16 to junior club, Cambuslang Rangers. Called up in season 1983-84.

DAVIE COOPER — Joined Rangers from Clydebank in 1977 and won all the domestic honours in his first season at Ibrox. International recognition soon followed.

ALLY DAWSON — Joined Rangers from school in 1975 and soon earned a place in the first team pool. Sustained a serious head injury on Rangers' Canadian tour of 1980 but showed great character in fighting back to full fitness and should go on to become one of Rangers' greatest servants.

DEREK FERGUSON — Young midfield player. Schoolboy Internationalist. Joined Rangers on an 'S' Form in 1983. Has played for Scotland's Under-15 team at Wembley and is now a regular Under-18 cap.

ERIC FERGUSON — Signed as an 'S' Form in 1980 from Gairdoch United, a Falkirk side. Has always been a goal scorer. Played for Scotland Under-16 team and also their Under-18 team as a reserve. Scored goals during his appearances for Scotland.

IAIN FERGUSON — Striker signed from Dundee in 1984. Rangers expect a lot of goals from this player in the future.

ROBERT FLECK — An ardent Rangers fan in his early days, Robert is a centre-forward or outside right.

CAMMY FRASER — Signed from Dundee in 1984 where he showed he has goalscoring abilities. An aggressive player with a tremendous will to win.

STUART MUNRO — Signed from Alloa Athletic in February 1984 after being with them for two years. A left midfield player who scores goals. Has been playing at left-back by Rangers.

ALLY McCOIST — After two previous attempts to sign him had failed, he was finally persuaded that his footballing future was at Ibrox and he left Sunderland for Rangers. His goalscoring feats

with St Johnstone earned him a great reputation which resulted in him being transferred to Sunderland for £400,000.

JOHN MacDONALD — Scored the total of 31 goals three years ago. A Schoolboy, Youth and Under-21 Internationalist.

DAVIE McKINNON — Signed from Partick Thistle where his displays against Rangers were carefully noted. Earlier in his career he played for Arsenal and Dundee. Overcame a kidney complaint which threatened his football career.

DAVIE McPHERSON — Tall defender who was called up from juvenile side Gartcosh four seasons ago and made his first team debut in a League Cup tie against Brechin City. Is recognised as one of the most promising youngsters on the Rangers' books.

CRAIG PATERSON — Signed from Hibernian where his father was an outstanding post-war centre-half.

ROBERT PRYTZ — Signed from Malmo where he was a first team player at 19 years of age. Capped at Under-21 level and played against Scotland three seasons ago. Superb passer who likes to go forward. A big favourite with the Rangers supporters and has established himself as a regular in Sweden's national team.

IAN REDFORD — Strong running player who is equally at home up front or in midfield. Formerly with Dundee, has played for Scotland at Youth and Under-21 level.

ROBERT RUSSELL — Signed from Shettleston Juniors after being rejected by Sunderland. Robert soon won a first team place and proved himself to be a valuable asset. Won "man of the match" awards in both 1978 and 1979 Scottish Cup finals and has also won Under-21 honours.

NICKY WALKER — Signed in December 1983 from Motherwell after a spell with Leicester City. Has been capped at Youth and Under-21 level and is now with his third senior club under Jock Wallace.

Also in the Rangers squad will be **DEREK JOHNSTONE** who returned to Ibrox from Chelsea this season and another recent signing **TED McMINN** from Queen of the South.

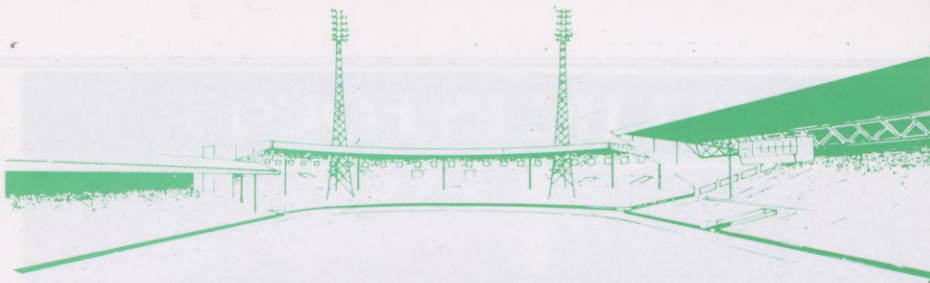

THIS TIME LAST YEAR ...

... Aberdeen were our visitors here at Celtic Park in a match we simply had to win to give ourselves any hope of winning the Premier League.

The match was fairly physical in the early stages with Celtic exerting all the pressure. The normally cool Aberdeen defence were having to resort to using illegal means to stop the Celtic forward line.

Indeed Celtic had what looked like a good penalty claim turned down when Willie Miller brought down Jim Melrose. However, Jim got his revenge in the 35th minute when he chested down a Tommy Burns pass and volleyed it past Jim Leighton into the back of the net. The first half ended with Celtic a goal up and well on top.

The second period however saw Aberdeen come more into the game, but this only gave Tom McAdam the chance to shine for the Bhoys. In fact Celtic's defence gave absolutely nothing away and the only time the Dons ever troubled Pat Bonner was when Gordon Strachan hit a fine shot late in the game.

In the end Aberdeen failed to get the much-needed equaliser and the result kept Celtic in touch with them at the top.

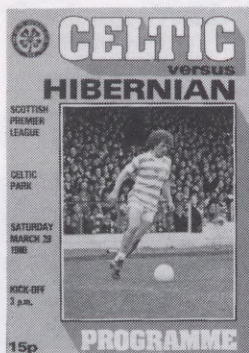

FIVE YEARS AGO ...



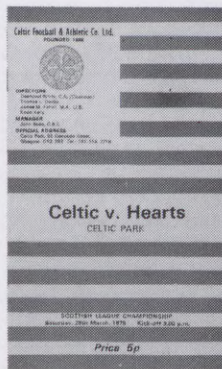
SATURDAY, MARCH 21, 1980

CELTIC went into attack right from the start of the game against Hibernian and it looked obvious that the Easter Road defence was going to have a busy afternoon. Indeed Celtic could have gone into the lead when a Danny McGrain cross was headed towards the net by Davie Provan. However Hibs' keeper McArthur managed to grab the ball before it crossed the line.

George Best, despite some very harsh barracking from a section of the fans, showed in rare flashes that he had lost none of his marvellous skills.

In the first minute of the second half full-back Brazil used a hand to prevent a cross from reaching Frank McGarvey and Bobby Lennox made no mistake from the spot. Celtic proceeded to put the outcome beyond all doubt with a devastating three goals in seven minutes. The first came when Davie Provan crossed perfectly for Frank McGarvey to head his first goal for the club. Four minutes later Burns and McGarvey set up an opening for Johnny Doyle and he finished the move with a low left foot shot into the corner of the net. In the 70th minute Roddie McDonald appeared from nowhere to head home a Davie Provan cross from close range.

TEN YEARS AGO ...



SATURDAY, MARCH 29, 1975

CELTIC were at home in a League match against Heart of Midlothian and won comfortably as follows: CELTIC 4 (Dalglish 2, Glavin, Wilson), HEARTS 1 (Busby). Celtic: Latchford; McGrain and McCluskey; Connelly, McNeill and Callaghan; Johnstone and Glavin; Dalglish; Hood and Wilson. Subs: Lynch (Dalglish) and MacDonald.

Despite this victory Celtic failed to win the League and John McPhail wrote in the following Wednesday's *Celtic View*: Celtic fans old enough to recall the ten years preceding the arrival of Jock Stein will remember that two League Cup triumphs was the sum total of the club's successes. And the League title of 1965-66 was Celtic's first in 12 years.

Instead of carping about the loss of the League, let's remember 10 glorious years and the wonderful records which will never be repeated by Celtic or any other club.

We will never forget the achievements and the Celtic board certainly do not intend them to float off down memory lane.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO ...



SATURDAY, MARCH 28, 1970

CELTIC'S winning of the League championship was deferred due to an unexpected defeat at the hands of Aberdeen at Celtic Park. The details of the match played at Parkhead on Wednesday, March 25, 1970 were: CELTIC 1 (Gemmell), ABERDEEN 2 (Murray G., Graham). Celtic: Williams; Craig and Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeill and Brogan; Johnstone and Connelly; Wallace; Lennox and Auld. Sub: Hay.

Three days later Celtic travelled to Tynecastle and got the point necessary to take the League flag to Celtic Park for the fifth successive season. Details of the Tynecastle game were: HEARTS 0, CELTIC 0. Celtic: Williams; Hay and Gemmell; Murdoch, Connelly and Brogan; Callaghan and Wallace; Quinn; Macari and Lennox. Sub: Hood.

With the League secured all eyes turned towards Celtic's European Cup semi-final clash with Leeds United and in particular the first leg at Elland Road. John McPhail wrote in the *View*: Few games in recent years have inspired so much interest, discussion and press comment as the clash between Leeds and Celtic. This is hardly surprising considering it is a battle between probably the greatest exponents of attacking football in Europe — Celtic and Leeds.

IT'S A FACT

- **THIS** is the 196th league meeting between Celtic and Rangers. Of the previous 195 we have won 62, drawn 58 and lost 75, scoring 262 goals and conceding 286.
- **SINCE** the start of the Premier League we have played Rangers 39 times winning 18, drawing 12 and losing just 9, scoring 58 goals and conceding 44, winning 48 points.
- **RANGERS** have only won once at Celtic Park in the 19 Premier League matches played here in the last 10 years and that was in 1980.
- **IN** the last 17 Old Firm Premier League games played anywhere, Rangers have only managed to win twice with Celtic winning 11.
- **THE** title of leading scorer in Old Firm Premier League matches is held jointly by Tom McAdam and Derek Johnstone with eight goals. Not far behind are Frank McGarvey, Charlie Nicholas and Derek Parlane with six goals apiece and next, perhaps surprisingly, is Roy Aitken, a man not renowned for his goalscoring ability, with five goals.

We'll be at Ibrox this afternoon to face Rangers who are currently second to us in the Premier Reserve League.

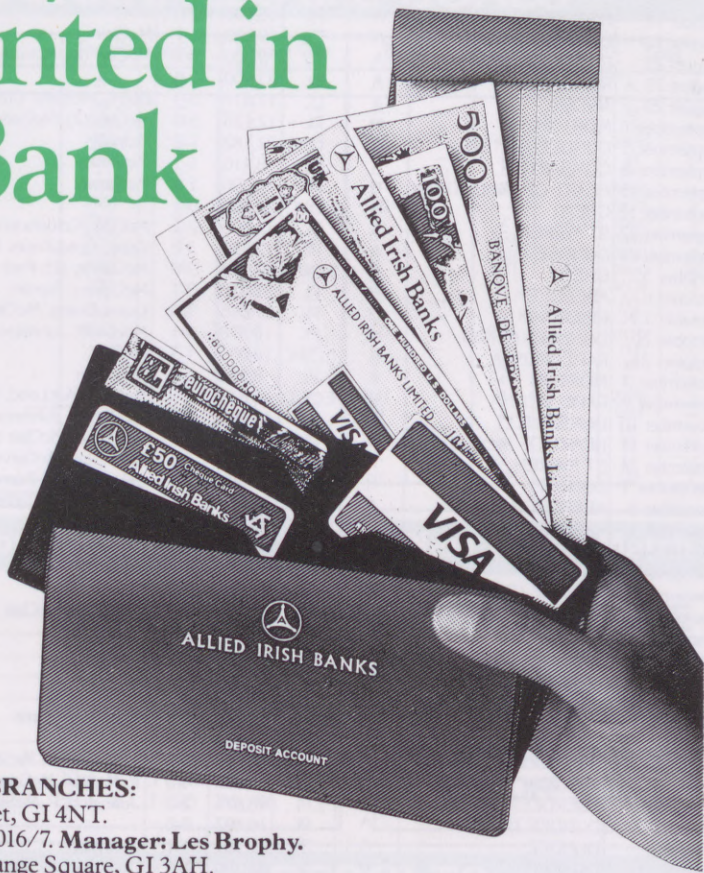

A MESSAGE TO CASUALS ... FORGET IT!

A NEW BRAND of hooliganism is threatening Scottish football in the form of gangs calling themselves 'Casuals'.

It has come to our attention that some of these thugs are associating themselves with Celtic. Our message to them is simple — FORGET IT!

Celtic will back the police in every way to stamp out this cancer which can only do great damage to Scottish football.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE (SCOTLAND) ACT 1982

THE FOLLOWING are some guidelines to the rulings of this Act with examples of punishment for breach of these rules.

We would urge fans to pay attention to these rules at all times while following Celtic:

Alcohol on vehicles travelling to or from sporting event: Where a public service vehicle is used principally for conveying passengers to or from the event then:

- 1 Any person in possession of alcohol on the vehicle shall be guilty of the offence (60 days imprisonment or £400 fine);
- 2 Any person who is drunk on the vehicle shall be guilty of an offence (60 days imprisonment or £400 fine).

Possession of container at sporting event: Any person who is in possession of a controlled container in the Stadium or while in possession of such a container attempts to enter the Stadium during the designated period of the event will be guilty of an offence (60 days imprisonment or £400 fine).

Note: Controlled container is any bottle, can or other portable container which could cause injury to a person if thrown against him/her.

Possession of alcohol at sporting event: Any person who is drunk in the Stadium or while in possession of alcohol attempts to enter the Stadium within the designated period shall be guilty of an offence (60 days imprisonment or £400 fine).

Drunkenness at sporting event: Any person who is drunk in the Stadium or while drunk attempts to enter the Stadium within the designated period shall be guilty of an offence (fine of £100).
