Next up for Rangers . . .

★ Rangers' match today is the last first team game that will be played at Ibrox this month. Next week the Light Blues will travel to Tynecastle for the second meeting of the season with Hearts. Rangers won 3-1 in August.

After that it's a visit to Dens Park for a clash with Dundee, who recorded a 1-0 victory at Ibrox in September.

Due to Scotland's World Cup commitments, the match between Rangers and Aberdeen at Pittodrie won't be played on November 30, so the game against Motherwell on December 7 will be the next match to be played by Rangers – and that's at Ibrox.

Today's man in the middle

★ Today's referee is one of Scotland's, indeed Europe's, most experienced officials, David Syme from Rutherglen.

The 42-year-old whistler took up refereeing at the age of 17 when he realised he would make it no further than amateur level as a player – and donning a black jersey every Saturday was the next best thing.

It was also a case of following in father's footsteps for Davie as his dad, Willie Syme, was one of the country's top refs in the late 1950s and early 1960s.

Davie has been a grade one official for the past 13 years and is now one of the most respected referees on the FIFA list having handled many European and international matches.

Domestically, his first big break came in 1978 when he took charge of the 1978 League Cup Final between Rangers and Celtic and he also was in charge of the 1983 Scottish Cup Final contested by Aberdeen and Rangers.

Davie is a sales manager for Seiko International and lives in Rutherglen with his wife Mary and children Alison (13) and Craig (12).

STUART'S WAITING TO CELEBRATE NEW YEAR!

STUART MUNRO this afternoon intends to wipe out a depressing memory which got this year off to a terrible start for him.

He's referring to the New Year's Day 'Old Firm' clash last season – the first at Ibrox Stuart had played in – when Celtic all but killed off Rangers league challenge with a 2-1 victory.

That match remains as the 23-year-old's unhappiest memory with Rangers so far and he's keen to be part of a winning side in an 'Old Firm' match for the first time this afternoon.

It will be Stuart's fifth match against Celtic – apart from that defeat at Ibrox, he also lined up in the two 1-1 draws at Parkhead last season and also played in this term's only 'Old Firm' clash at Parkhead which also finished 1-1.

Stuart says: "I really enjoy playing against Celtic. The atmosphere is always tremendous and you are constantly aware of just how important the result is to the fans and the players alike.

"To draw at Parkhead in the three games I have played there have been considered as good results for us, although we were all a bit disappointed we didn't do better after taking the lead in the first half the last time.

"The biggest disappointment for me, though, was that New Year's Day defeat last season. We had just gone through December unbeaten and had a great chance to put ourselves back into the championship chase.

"But, after a good first half display when we took the lead with a magic Davie Cooper goal, we let ourselves, the manager and the fans down by playing appallingly badly in the second half and losing 2-1.

"I was so confident we would win that match. I was sick afterwards and it spoiled any plans I had to celebrate New Year – so I'm looking to make up for that this afternoon!"

Stuart has really come of age as a Premier League player, making the left-back position his own with a string of fine consistent performances, although he rarely gains the credit he deserves.

When he did gain a bit of publicity recently, it was for the wrong sort of reason – he headed an unfortunate own goal against Hibs at Ibrox to give the Easter Road men their first in a 2-1 win.

"That was a bit of a nightmare but it's not the sort of thing I could afford to lose any sleep over. We didn't clear the ball properly and Gordon Rae sent over a cross from the right.

"I don't think he hit it right as it was neither high nor along the ground but around waist height. But my only thought was to clear it as there were a lot of Hibs players in our box – it came off my head wrongly and the next thing I knew it was in the net. It's the first own goal I've ever scored and I hope it's the last."

That is a minor blot on Stuart's copybook this season and although he gives the impression of being a quiet player, he doesn't lack in confidence – as his thoughts on today's match show.

"I think we have better players than Celtic and that's why we should win today. I enjoy pitting my wits against the likes of Davie Provan and I have done well against him in the past.

"Nothing less than a win will do for Rangers today and we will be doing everything we can to make sure our supporters are celebrating at the end of the match.

"I'm confident they will be – and then maybe I can make up for some lost celebrating from last New Year!"



THIS first ever Premier League clash between the 'Old Firm' produced three goals, one ordering off, and a series of magnificent saves by both keepers. Quite simply, it had everything!

A crowd of 69,000 were at Ibrox to watch the Glasgow rivals kick off the new League format in its first season, and be present as Rangers proudly unfurled the Championship flag, which had been won the previous season.

The game was only three minutes old when Derek Johnstone forced Celtic keeper, Peter Latchford, into a great save from a close-in header. The England Under-23 international 'keeper then followed this up with more heroics with Quinton Young and Johnstone, once more, coming close for the Light Blues.

Celtic, though, scored first in the 42nd minute. Dalglish sped past Jardine and forced his way into the Rangers box, to unleash a left foot rocket. The ball took a deflection off the unfortunate Jackson and flew past McCloy into the net.

There was a further shock for Rangers fans when the players appeared for the second half - Sandy Jardine was missing. He had suffered a first-half ankle injury and was replaced by Alex O'Hara. Jardine had received a knock from the first half.

Latchford succeeded in frustrating Johnstone again in the 51st minute with a brilliant point blank stop from a shot but, 60 seconds later, Derek blasted in the

equaliser from 20 yards.

Quinton Young then put Rangers ahead 16 minutes later. Cleverly beating Pat McCluskey on the right, 'Cutty' ran a few yards before shooting past Latchford with a left foot drive from 8 yards.

Alex MacDonald was sensationally ordered off in the 72nd minute after a clash with Danny McGrain, and Rangers then had to dig in to survive for the last 18 minutes. Peter McCloy was called upon to perform miracles - and did! He made great saves from substitute Andy Ritchie and Danny McGrain as Rangers held out for victory.

CELTIC

THIS afternoon's 'Old Firm' clash is possibly one of the most important in the fixture's long history - for both Rangers and Celtic.

The oldest and most famous rivals in world club football meet for the second time this season, and they have not had their troubles to seek in recent weeks.

● BOTH have crashed out of Europe to Spanish opposition - a severe blow to both finances and prestige and a big disappointment to the fans of Rangers and Celtic, who view European participation as a right.

● BOTH made their exit from the Skol League Cup to Hibernian - and that means all that is left for the 'Old Firm' in 1985-86 is the Premier League and the Scottish Cup.

And it is the Premier League that has caused respective bosses Jock Wallace and Davie Hay most heartache in recent weeks as unexpected defeats have been suffered - Rangers at home to Hibs and away to St Mirren, Celtic at Parkhead against Hearts, then Dundee United.

As if that wasn't enough, the 'Old Firm' have had to watch Aberdeen further threaten their positions at the top of the Scottish game by taking over the Premier League leadership and also winning the season's first trophy, the Skol League Cup, with their 3-0 win over Hibs at Hampden.

It's all very worrying for Rangers and Celtic - but what is the answer?

Well, certainly nothing would be better for the players confidence and the fans spirits than a victory over their biggest rivals - and that's what Jock Wallace and Davie Hay will be impressing on their respective sides in the dressing-rooms before today's match.

Rangers realise that two points today would be the perfect way to launch themselves back into the championship chase.

For Celtic, two points are equally as important - so it could add up to one of the most exciting 'Old Firm' matches for a long time.

The boss . . . Davie Hay

★ For the amount of achievements he has packed into his career, it's hard to believe that Celtic boss Davie Hay is only 37 years old.

As a player, he signed for the Parkhead club in 1967 from St Mirren Boys Guild and he went on to prove himself as one of Scottish football's top midfield players.

He made 268 appearances for Celtic, scoring 12 goals, until he was transferred for £250,000 in July 1974. He also played in the World Cup Finals in West Germany that year and his career with Scotland saw him win 27 caps.

A favourite with the fans at Stamford Bridge, his career

was cut short in October 1978 when he suffered a bad eye injury in a match against Bolton and was later forced to hang up his boots.

His first step into management was in October 1981 when he took over as boss of Motherwell from Ally MacLeod and he steered the Fir Park club to the 1982 First Division title.

He then quit to go to a coaching post in Florida with his family but that proved a disaster and he sensationally returned to Scotland in July 1983 to take over from Billy McNeill as Celtic manager. Last season saw him win the Scottish Cup - his first trophy as Parkhead boss.

PAT BONNER: Goalkeeper. Born 25.5.60. Year of signing: 1978. Appearances last season: 48. Appropriately for an Irishman, Pat made his debut on St. Patrick's Day (March 17) 1979 against Motherwell at Fir Park. He then returned to the reserves as understudy to Peter Latchford until August 1980 when he came into the side to face Manchester United in a testimonial match for Danny McGrain and he has been the regular first choice goalkeeper ever since. Been capped 11 times by Republic of Ireland.

DANNY MCGRAIN: Defender. Born 1.5.50. Year of signing: 1968. Appearances last season: 44. The only player currently on Celtic's books to have scored in the old style First Division, Danny has represented Celtic in 52 European matches. Having also captained Scotland - he won 62 caps - he is one of the most respected players in the Scottish game. His performances in both full-back positions last season showed he is still one of the best defenders around.

TOMMY BURNS: Midfielder/Defender. Born 16.12.56. Year of signing: 1974. Appearances last season: 36. With Danny McGrain and Peter Latchford, Tommy is one of only three current Celtic players to have played in the old style First Division. During last season, he scored the goal which made Celtic the first team to reach a total of 700 in the Premier League. In all he has scored nearly 70 goals during his time with Celtic. Playing at full-back this season and, after a hesitant start, has settled down very nicely.

WILLIE MCSTAY: Defender. Born 26.11.61. Year of signing: 1979. Appearances last season: 18. Brother of midfielder Paul, Willie is a hard tackling defender. Troubled with injury this term and has lost his place to Danny McGrain.

PAUL MCGUGAN: Defender. Born 17.7.64. Year of signing: 1980. Appearances last season: 3. An outstanding player in the reserves, Paul is a commanding figure in the centre of defence. He has made the big breakthrough this season and has played very well indeed. Played in the Old Firm match in May when the teams drew 1-1.

TOM MCADAM: Defender. Born 9.4.54. Year of signing: 1977. Appearances last season: 38. Originally signed for Celtic from Dundee United as a forward, he made a very smooth switch to the centre of defence and has served there very solidly. His loyalty to the club was recognised at the end of last season when the Celtic Supporters' Association chose him as the Guest of Honour at their annual rally. Tom has been in the unique position of playing against his brother, Colin, in an 'Old Firm' match. He is also Celtic's top post-war scorer in 'Old Firm' league matches, having netted ten times.

ROY AITKEN: Defender. Born 24.11.58. Year of signing: 1975. Appearances last season: 45. Roy played his 300th league game for Celtic earlier this year - a statistic which belies his age of only 26. He was in brilliant form in the Scottish Cup Final win over Dundee United in May, setting up the second goal with a finishing run and telling cross.

DAVIE PROVAN: Forward. Born 8.5.56. Year of signing: 1978. Appearances last season: 29. An international right-winger, Davie Provan is one of the best strikers of a dead ball in the game. Defensive walls rarely distract him when he has the opportunity to score with a free kick. His equaliser in last season's Scottish Cup Final was a great example of his accuracy in this department and took his total of goals for Celtic to 38.

PETER GRANT: Midfielder. Born 30.8.65. Year of signing: 1982. Appearances last season: 29. Peter made his first team appearance against Rangers in April 1984 at Ibrox. Since then he has become a powerful midfielder and a very important part of the Celtic squad.

CELTIC SQUAD



PAUL MCSTAY: Midfielder. Born 22.10.64. Year of signing: 1981. Appearances last season: 43. A player about whom every superlative has been used and of whom great things are expected at club and international level. With his brother, Willie, he is continuing a family tradition at Celtic, following in the footsteps of great uncles Willie and Jimmy of pre-war days.

BRIAN MCCLAIR: Midfielder/Forward. Born 8.12.63. Year of signing: 1983. Appearances last season: 36. Celtic's top goalscorer for the last two seasons, Brian is equally at home in the midfield or as an out-and-out striker. Having reached a total of 42 league goals in his two seasons since signing from Motherwell, only five Celtic players, since the inception of the Premier League, have scored more league goals than him. In all he has scored 63 goals for Celtic and is the third top scorer currently on the books.

MURDO MACLEOD: Midfielder. Born 24.9.58. Year of signing: 1978. Appearances last season: 42. Always dependable, Murdo ended last season, one of his best as a Celt, by being called into the Scotland squad and playing against England at Hampden. A hard working midfielder, Murdo is a great team man and demonstrated this with some good performances at left back during last season. He is the top goalscorer currently on Celtic's books having netted 76 for the club until the start of season 1985/86.

MAURICE JOHNSTON: Forward. Born 13.4.63. Year of signing: 1984. Appearances last season: 34. When Celtic brought him back to Scotland from Watford for £400,000, Maurice became the most expensive player to play in the Scottish League. With a reputation as a goalscorer, he scored 19 for Celtic in his 34 games last season. A Scottish internationalist, he has netted ten times this season. Injured in recent game v Dundee United and may be touch and go for this afternoon's game.

OWEN ARCHDEACON: Forward. Born 4.3.66. Year of signing: 1982. Appearances last season: 1. A natural left sided player, Owen has been a prolific goalscorer for Celtic reserves and the Scottish Youth team in the past. Made debut as a sub in April 1984 and scored in 4-2 victory over Motherwell. Made several appearances this term and was on target v Hibs in September - netting once in a 5-0 victory.

ALAN MCINALLY: Forward. Born 10.2.63. Year of signing: 1984. Appearances last season: 6. Alan went to Celtic from Ayr United with a goalscoring reputation and netted four times in six games last season. His appearances are then kept down through injury. Nicknamed 'Rambo' by the Parkhead fans.

MARK MCGHEE: Striker. Born 25.5.57. Signed at the beginning of this week from Hamburg for a fee of around £150,000. Will help fill the gap vacated by Maurice Johnston because of Mo's ankle injury. McGhee was also with Aberdeen, where he helped them to two championships, three Scottish Cups, the Cup-Winners Cup and the Super Cup. Also played with Morton and Newcastle United and should be a good buy for Celtic.

SATURDAY FORECAST

● A look back to events which happened in the same week 10, 20 and 30 years ago.

10 YEARS AGO

Rangers slumped to a 2-1 league defeat against Hearts on November 8 at Ibrox. Hearts raced into a 2-0 lead. Kenny Aird broke away down the wing in the 14th minute and crossed to a perfectly placed Willie Gibson. The linesman had his flag up but the referee chose to ignore it and the striker tapped home. Gibson notched his second three minutes later with a shot.

Despite scoring immediately after the restart, in the 46th minute, Rangers could not salvage a point. Martin Henderson latched onto a poor Prentice pass-back and shot past Cruickshank in goal, but the victory kept Hearts joint top of the table on 13 points from 11 matches.

Celtic lost 1-0 to Dundee at Dens Park, with Bobby Robinson netting the winner before a 16,456 crowd.

Motherwell, the joint Premier League leaders, beat Aberdeen 3-0 at Fir Park. Scorers were Peter Millar, Bobby Graham and Ian Taylor.

Down south, Francis Lee and Norman Hunter were being charged with bringing the game into disrepute for a fight at the Derby County v Leeds United match. After being sent off, they promptly started fighting again while leaving the field! The incident was watched by millions of fans on television.

Comedian Eric Morecambe resigned from the board of directors at Luton Town and George Best was released by Manchester United. He immediately signed for Stockport County on a month's contract. Manchester United signed a young winger from Millwall for £70,000 - his name - Gordon Hill.

20 YEARS AGO

John Greig was on top of the world on November 9. He scored the only goal for Scotland against Italy at Hampden which gave the Scots hope of qualifying for the finals in England the following year.

Greig's 89th minute wonder strike sent the 101,293 crowd wild with delight. Jim Baxter sent a pass into the box, the Italian defence hesitated, and Greig ran on to shoot past Negri from 15 yards.

Hibs signed Alan Cousins from Dundee for a £12,000 fee. The 29 year old wing half's move proved to be a shock move in the Scottish transfer front.

Sport was also highlighted on the box with *Sportsview* on the BBC for 25 minutes, and *Scotsport* on STV for 10 minutes. The kiddies could laugh at *The Magic Roundabout*.

30 YEARS AGO

Rangers' goal heroes were Don Kitchenbrand and George Young as they sunk Hearts at Tynecastle on November 12, and gained another valuable two league points. Both scored doubles in a 4-1 win, with Young netting a consolation effort for the Edinburgh side.

Three days previously, Scotland beat Wales 2-0 at Hampden as the Home Internationals drew to a close. A crowd of 55,887 saw Bobby Johnstone, the Manchester City striker, scoring both the goals.

Entertainment saw Andy Stewart starring in *Dick Whittington* at the Royal Theatre, Glasgow. At the Alhambra, Glasgow, Kenneth McKellar and Stanley Baxter were appearing in *Cinderella*.

RANGERS- A HISTORY

Season 1951-52

THIS was another disappointing season for Rangers in terms of trophies, but manager Bill Struth and the supporters took heart from the promise of the younger players at the club.

The Reserve team, in fact, made almost a clean sweep of the trophies available to them. They ran away with the Reserve League title, won the Second Eleven Cup and only lost out in the semi-final of the Reserve League Cup to Aberdeen at Pittodrie.

And two of those young players made the breakthrough to the first team. Goalkeeper George Niven and full-back Eric Caldow were the debut boys and both would go on to have fine careers at Ibrox.

The first team were once again runners-up to Hibernian in the league championship race. The Easter Road side were enjoying a real glory period at that stage with their 'Famous Five' forward line causing havoc in defences all over the country.

Rangers, in fact, remained unbeaten against Hibs, drawing 2-2 at Ibrox and 1-1 at Easter Road. But it was against teams like East Fife, Raith Rovers and Dundee that the Light Blues threw away needless points and they finished up four points behind Hibs.

The highlight of Rangers' league campaign, though, was on New Year's Day when they faced Celtic at Parkhead. Playing without skipper Jock Shaw for most of the second half, the Light Blues crushed their old rivals 4-1 with goals from Colin Liddell, Willie Paton (2) and Willie Waddell.

In the Scottish Cup, Rangers made a controversial exit in the fourth round at Fir Park.

After drawing 1-1 with Motherwell at Ibrox, the replay saw a hotly-disputed penalty given against George Young. Motherwell scored with the award and won the match 2-1, going on to beat Dundee 4-0 in the cup final.

In the League Cup, Rangers beat Celtic 3-0 on their way to the final but lost out to Dundee at Hampden. George Young equalised as Rangers trailed 2-1 but Alfie Boyd scored a late winner for Dundee to take the trophy to Dens Park.

The season also saw Rangers continue their series of friendly matches against Arsenal and, for the first time, the clubs met under floodlights, the Gunners winning a great match at Highbury 3-2.

George Young was once again Scotland's captain and made nine appearances in the Dark Blue that season. Other Rangers capped were Bobby Brown, Willie Woodburn, Sammy Cox, Willie Waddell, Ian McColl and Willie Thornton.

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RESERVE REVIEW

RANGERS Reserves stumbled to their first defeat of the season on October 22 at Ibrox against Hibs. Their 2-1 defeat, however, made no difference to their position at the top of the Premier Reserve League.

Billy Davies was on the scoring trail again and, in the 25th minute, he gave Rangers the lead. Iain Ferguson sent him clear with a fine through ball and, from 16 yards, he blasted past the helpless McKellar in goal.

Hibs, though, equalised five minutes before half-time with a penalty kick after Derek Johnstone had fouled Cliff Tortolano made no mistake from the spot.

Willie Irvine was the Hibs hero in the 85th minute when he scored the winner for the Edinburgh club. Micky Weir sent over a perfect cross and Irvine was handily placed to bullet home from 12 yards.

Saints took the lead in the 25th minute when Bruce could not hold a 16 yard shot and the rebound was promptly forced home.

It took until the 78th minute to break through the Love Street defensive barrier. Billy Davies beat two defenders in a powerful run and completed the job with a powerful 15 yard shot.

David MacFarlane scored the winner in the 84th minute. After a fine move involving Williamson and MacDonald, the youngster finished it off with a 14 yard drive.

Rangers defender, Ronnie Yule, was carried off in the 30th minute with a bad ligament injury.

THE DAY I WAS BORN

Ian Durrant
October 29, 1966

THE left foot of Celtic full-back, Willie O'Neill, stopped Rangers from taking the League Cup final to a replay that day as 94,532 fans crammed into Hampden to watch an explosive final.

With Celtic leading 1-0, late in the second half, the Light Blues launched a last gasp attack. A cross from the left caused panic in the Parkhead defence and Ronnie Simpson was stranded with the goal wide open.

Alex Smith sent in a fierce shot which appeared netbound, until O'Neill stuck out a left foot and it was good enough to deflect the ball out for a corner. Rangers had missed their last chance.

Bobby Lennox had given Celtic the lead in the first half, but Rangers were furious late in the second half when referee Tom Wharton disallowed an equalising goal.

Once again it was a cross ball which set up the chance. Keeper Ronnie Simpson rose with Billy McNeill and Alex Smith. The ball broke loose to the waiting Bobby Watson, who rammed it into the net from four yards.

The Rangers fans went wild with joy, but their celebrations were cut short. Wharton signalled a free-kick for an infringement on Billy McNeill, even though critics at the time said no clear foul appeared to have been committed.

Celts then held out for their second successive League Cup triumph.

It is interesting to note that Steve Chalmers was the first ever substitute in a Hampden final.

Celtic star, Bertie Auld, was in a spot of bother AFTER the match. Collecting the match ball, the jubilant Auld immediately kicked it into the Celtic end of the ground. Naturally, all hope of the ball being retrieved was lost and considering its value was £5 - then a fortune - the Hampden officials were not too pleased with his action.

Kilmarnock were preparing for their Fairs Cup tie, the following Wednesday against Royal Antwerp, with a 1-0 win over Airdrie at Rugby Park. Bertelson scored the winner in the 69th minute with a close-in header.

Dunfermline were also gearing themselves up for their Fairs Cup tie in Zagreb, Yugoslavia, against the local team. Announcing a squad of 16 players, the Fifers included a promising youngster called Alex Totten.

Hearts were sinking to a 1-0 defeat at Tynecastle to Clyde in their First Division battle. Stewart was the hero for the 'Bully Wee' early in the second half.

Former Scotland team boss, John Prentice, was Canada bound to take up a management post in Vancouver. New York were also interested in him, so much so that they tabled a bid of £8,000 to entice him away from the Canadian side.

Joe Mason was the Morton hero that day as he gave the Cappielow side a valuable victory over Alloa, at Recreation Park, with a solitary goal in the second half. Their 1-0 win kept them in a good position in the Second Division.

US President, Lyndon Johnson, delivered a nuclear bomb warning to China. In a stern statement he said, "The leaders of China must realise that any nuclear capability they can develop can, and will, be deterred." It was his first comment on the latest Chinese nuclear development.

Starting on the box were *The Munroes*, the pop programme *Countdown* with Cat Stevens and Manfred Mann, and *The Good Old Days*.

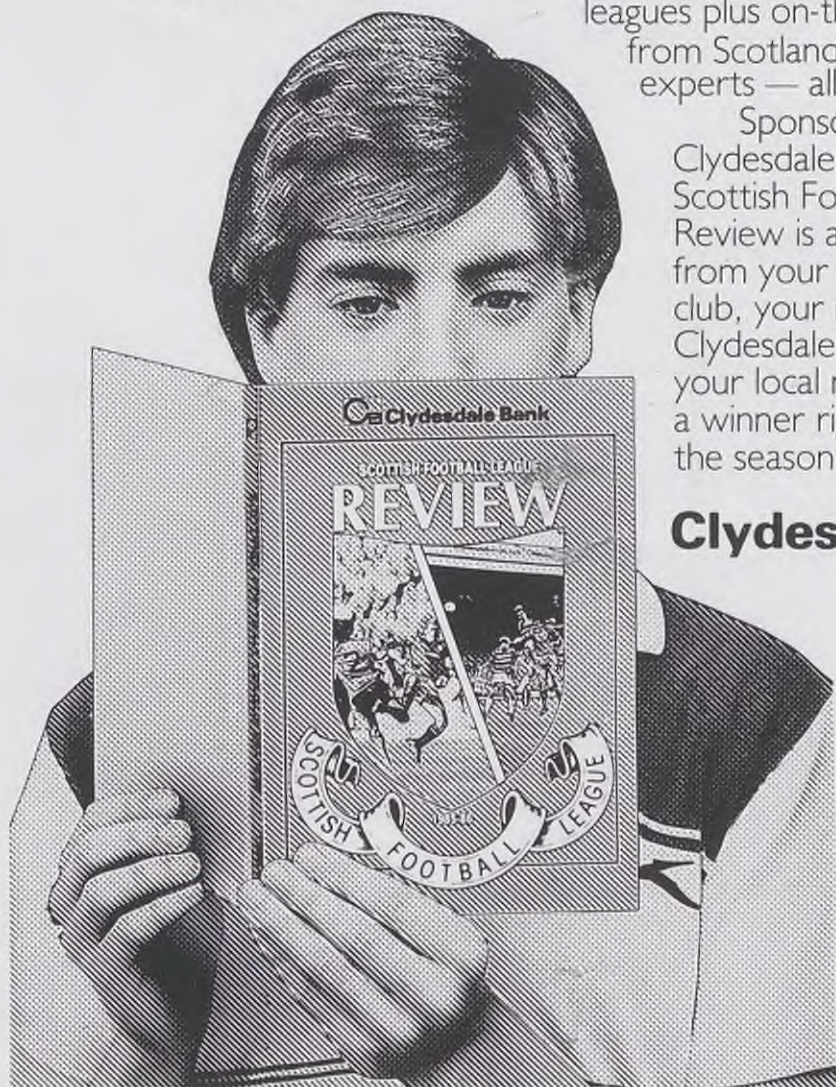
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
